RECTOR'S REPORT

It has been a strange old year. The gospel doesn't change, Jesus' promises do not waiver, the truth is still the truth but the world around us appears to be oblivious to the spiritual reality and many of us are quite bewildered by the changes occuring. The Church of England has had a difficult time around safeguarding, historical errors and present practice; around Living in 9III⁹9 liturgical provision and continues to struggle with its role in a multiethnic, post-Christian and increasingly anti-Christian society.

We haven't had it easy here at St Leonard's either. Our Parish Centre redevelopment has gone for another appeal, despite the local planning officers supporting our application. Relationships with the local community have not been easy. This has been exacerbated by the use of the local and national press to bad mouth and undermine our local reputation. The rollercoaster ride has been fuelled by misinformation and personal attacks, thus spreading confusion and bitterness. The Cultural audit that we agreed to at the end of the year has also undermined our corporate confidence in our message, our methods and our trust of the wider church. As a friend says - TRUST IS A MUST - but is a hard thing to do when the starting point for most people is suspicion.

We have lost too many friends this year. Some have passed to glory and some have moved away - we miss them all. A huge thanks to Peter and Katie Flory, who stayed with us despite their upset with the national church to ensure our 2024 accounts and TAR were completed. They have so much knowledge and experience. We will miss them.

The team we have at St Leonard's is amazing and they continue to deliver in circumstances that are not always easy. Jonny leads our worship with sensitivity and quality - a mature Christian couple joined us just before Christmas and were impacted by the worship. He is doing a great job as our youth leader and his team support him admirably. This all at the same time as being a new Dad! We welcomed Alice back to the office in November and this has taken some pressure off of Ruth. Ruth continues to work out her vocation. A placement in Denham was a helpful time for her, and I know they appreciated her going to them. Ruth continues to keep me in order and mostly on time and nearly always in the right place!! Though I still won't get to grips with ChurchSuite! Bekki works hard for and blesses our younger children - thank you to her team as well.

So much of what we do relies on volunteers - homegroups, seniors, hospitality etc. Thank you to you all - outsiders are often surprised at the proportion of our church family members who are also volunteers.

We continue to support our Kingdom Partners, who have all had really rough times this past year and I have been encouraged by the regular folk who come to the Watchman Prayer times. Prayer is key to all we do. The Swedes were with us just before Easter and our partnership with Rise Nations (Jared & Sharlene) continues as they use the UK as a stepping stone to many projects across the world.

We also took our final step in the reorganising of our worship times this summer. We have moved to one family service in church on a Sunday morning to emphasise our unity and our identity as a family. Thank you to all who have supported this.



For me there have been two distinct highlights of the year. The first was our Parish Weekend away with Simon Guillebaud from Great Lakes Outreach. He was challenging and encouraging in equal measure and there was a real sense of unity over the weekend. Let's embrace Wild Faith and press on.

The second highlight was the Overnight Worship time in the summer: praise and thanksgiving, worshipping for breakthrough. Jonny did the lion's share but a huge thank you to Marcus van Rest who did the post Midnight slot. I was delighted by the numbers who came to the event - not once but often several times in the night and then ALL turned up again as we moved seamlessly into corporate worship on the Sunday morning. When's the next one?

God is good all the time.

Circumstances change and challenge us about but we are hidden with Christ in the Father's love - how safe can we be?

Hold firm my friends. We are a courageous, lionhearted and prophetic community.

RESPONSE FROM THE WARDENS

2024 remained a year of change and uncertainty at St Leonards.

Laurie continued to lead with the support of our two LLMs, Peter Flory and Jackie Lambert, who played a significant role, particularly in the 8:30am service. After much prayer and consideration, it became clear to the wider leadership that the Lord was calling us to unity and for the current season, it meant one main Sunday morning worship service for the whole church family together. The 8.30am services came to a finish in September 2024. We acknowledge that this transition was not easy for many members of the former 8:30am congregation, but we are deeply grateful for their openness to change. We especially appreciate the majority who have continued to attend regularly at 10:30am – your faithfulness is truly commendable.

We should also mention those who have stepped up to lead services to support Laurie including Denise, Sam and Jonny along with the home groups, who have very generously provided refreshments week in week out - your tea, coffee, delicious home bakes and biscuits are very much appreciated!



We also continue with the fortnightly evening Encounter services in the church.

We would like to especially thank Peter and Katie Flory for their endless service to St Leonards over many years. Their contributions go far beyond leading services, catering, preaching, sharing their musical talents, and taking on numerous other jobs. We are particularly grateful for the countless, often unseen hours they have dedicated to managing the church's financial affairs. You have done the most incredible job providing the PCC with financial information to make clear decisions and ensuring our financial affairs are in order. Having decided to step down after the APCM in preparation for leaving at the end of December, they even stepped back in to provide continuity during the latter part of the year until a new, more long term treasurer could be appointed and to make sure the end of year accounts are in order. We thank Tom Brewer for taking on the treasurer role at the APCM and fully appreciate the reasons why we needed to find an alternative option. We are sad that Peter and Katie have taken the decision to leave the Church of England, but we wish them well as they embark on their journey with their new church family.

We continue to be grateful for the time and energy given to the church by all those in leadership, in so many ways enabling our church life to function; our Elders for their prayer and prophetic guidance, the commitment and faithfulness of the PCC members who so prayerfully consider decisions large and small for the operation of the church is much appreciated, especially in the new slimmed down PCC and, of course, our fantastic staff team who keep everything in order!

Thank you to Ruth Leach who picked up extra work during Alice's maternity leave and those who volunteered to support her, especially those who took on organising yet another fabulous and expertly led church weekend away in April. We were delighted to be joined by Simon Guillebaud from Great Lakes Outreach who taught us from his extensive experience in Burundi. It was a challenging weekend from a spiritual point of view but also great fun to spend time together as family.

We were delighted to release Ruth during the autumn to a placement at St. Mary's, Denham as she explores ordination and we continue to pray for her journey.

We are grateful for the support of Chesham Bois School enabling us to use their facilities on Sunday mornings. Bekki has continued to lead regular Junior Church sessions supported by a team of dedicated volunteers who pour their faith and love of Jesus into our younger members. There have also been regular school holiday Fun Days attracting local families who are otherwise unconnected to St Leonards. This has been a wonderful outreach and we are thankful for Bekki and the volunteers that make these events possible and provide wonderful activities and such a warm welcome for the parents and carers.

We could not write this report without mentioning our amazing youth and their leaders! It is always a delight to see so many young people worshipping regularly and we know this does not happen by chance. Many thanks to Jonny and his team of youth leaders including Paul, James, David and Denise. Thank you for going the extra mile to share Jesus through your many activities including Sunday breakfasts, worship jams, midweek evening sessions, and your dedicated support of our young people throughout the year. A special thank you for giving your time for residential weekends and Limitless in August.



A second Planning Application for the Parish Centre was submitted during 2023 with the decision deferred until February 2024. Our application was again rejected by the Planning Committee at this stage. After some months of prayerful reflection, the PCC voted to go to appeal in the summer. At the time of writing we are still awaiting a final decision from the Planning Inspectorate.

Last and most importantly, we want to thank Laurie and Wendy for their witness and steadfast faith in what has been another difficult year for them personally and us as a church. They have given of themselves sacrificially and continued to preach the gospel no matter what. Please join the leadership in continuing to pray for them and uphold them as leaders and asking for God's protection over them. Leading a church in these times is an unenviable task.

WARDENS' REPORT ON THE FABRIC AND CHURCH PROPERTIES

In January 2024, a dead tree was felled in the churchyard in order to make the site safe.

During March, in both the Church and Parish Centre, the annual fire extinguisher service took place followed by the gas boiler servicing in May. In October the Church clock was serviced and a carbon monoxide monitor was installed in the vestry. PAT testing was carried out in the Church in December. A lightning conductor survey was carried out for the Church in November and we are still awaiting the report.

Pest control came to the church site in April 2024 to check for mice.

St Leonards underwent its Quinquennial Inspection in August 2024. No major urgent repairs were found but a number of recommendations were made such as inspecting and clearing gutters and checking roof condition. The Wardens and PCC are aware that work needs to be undertaken on the chimney above the vestry and are awaiting quotes for this work. Should we have scaffolding for that repair, inspections will take place at the same time. The church and PC gutters were cleared in December.

A fence post in the car park, which was knocked over, has been temporarily fixed whilst we await quotes for a permanent solution.

The Church continues to use 19 Stubbs End Close (Amersham) under Licence form the Chiltern Christian Trust. During the year, we redecorated one of the bedrooms in the house, as well as carried out a deep clean of the property.

Thank you to the Property and Fabric Committee and Office Manager for overseeing these property matters.

PCC TREASURER'S REPORT

In 2024 both income and expenditure in the General Fund increased, resulting in a net surplus in the General Fund. We received two legacies totalling £25,698.72 and a one-off gift of £100,000 which was split between the General and Parish Centre Build Funds. The giving to our Mission partners has been sustained.

In 2024 we paid our full Parish Share to the Diocese.

In 2024 the PCC spent £20,719.05 on the Parish Centre development project and received gifts of £7,474.40 for the project.

Our Lord and Father is abundantly generous to us, and many within our church family have continued to mirror that generosity through their giving. The budget for 2025 acknowledges a need to reduce our expenditure and calls us to pray for provision in support of His work here.

I would like to express my gratitude to everyone who has supported me in my new role as treasurer, especially Katie and Peter Flory, whose knowledge and guidance during the handover process have been invaluable. I also want to thank Ruth Leach and Alice Somervell for their ongoing assistance in the office.

SAFEGUARDING

St Leonard's is working in line with the Church of England's Safeguarding Policy and Practice Guidance, and has a safeguarding team of 3 volunteers, led by Denise as the Parish Safeguarding Officer. Marion is the DBS and safeguarding training administrator, and Sam represents us at PCC meetings, where safeguarding is a standing item on the agenda. Our safeguarding procedures and training are supported by software from Oxford Diocese known as a Parish Dashboard that enables us to retain an overview of our mandatory requirements for staff and volunteers. We currently run at 94% progress. This is mainly down to the on-going hard work and diligence of Marion.

All roles at St Leonards require some level of safeguarding training, which can be done online, and we follow Church of England guidance to ensure that we ask people to complete the relevant modules for their roles. We fully recognise that a lot of people have already completed safeguarding training in different parts of their working or volunteer lives, but it is a C of E requirement that we complete their training programme, as it uses scenarios from church and Christian life as part of the learning involved.

At the time of writing, there are 52 people at St Leonards who have roles requiring at least one module of online training, and our records show that we are up to date with 88% of the training. We would like to thank all those who have spent time completing the modules, and we very much hope to be able to report a 100% completion rate next year.



In late 2024, St Leonard's was asked by the Oxford Diocese to take part in a cultural audit carried out by an interdependent safeguarding agency, thirtyone:eight. The interviews are to be carried out beginning 2025 and relevant outcomes will be reported in next year's APCM.

A big Thank You to staff and volunteers alike for their commitment to the training and administration required to keep a safer environment for all who attend our church and its activities.

PRAYER AT ST LEONARD'S

I always find praying with people, either in an Original Design or freedom prayer appointment or on Sundays a real privilege. God always shows up and touches the person being prayed for, bringing his revelation, encouragement, healing and freedom.

Over 2024, the prayer team prayed for people on 55 occasions, including praying for some couples. The team also prayed for Original design by email for 22 people from St Judes Southsea and for 34 Swedish Young People over on a Mission Trip with Rise nations. When the Original Design was given to the Swedish young people they were amazed at the accuracy of the revelation, which was a great encouragement to them and those that had prayed for the OD.

In November, Laurie ran some JM wide Prayer Team training which a number of St Leonard's prayer team attended. A number of people have commented how great the training was and the privilege of gathering together with other churches and praying for each other.

Watchman prayer has continued throughout the year, with a number of regular people attending, to pray for the life of St Leonard's and the community of Chesham Bois.

During Sunday services it has been amazing to see God move and bring healing through the healing wells and prayer ministry during extended times of worship.

CHILDREN'S MINISTRY

We have 7 children (4-11 yrs old) who attend Junior Church on a Sunday regularly. Junior Church joins with the church family in worship before heading over to Chesham Bois School for their own worship time. We start with refreshments and catch up, followed by creative prayer using movement or a prayer dice. The children like the creative prayer and connecting with God. The children enjoy reading the bible passage, finding it in the children's bibles and discovering if the passage is Old or New Testament. They engage well during the discussion about the passage and how it relates to them in everyday life. Some children listen and engage better while colouring a picture or drawing. We also show a YouTube video called Superbook relevant to the Bible passage and also do some craft. Some weeks we play active games before rejoining the church family for hospitality back in church.

At Christmas, Junior Church joined with the youth to host the Christmas Family Celebration. The children enjoyed helping plan the service and I was really encouraged to see all those who wanted to participate be fully involved in the service.

During each of the school holidays we have Junior Church Fundays, which are attended mainly by non St Leonard's families. This is a great outreach into the community. During each fun day we have



games, bible teaching, food and crafts. Over the last year, we have introduced a time of worship, led by Jonny, which the children have enjoyed, a great addition to our fundays - thank you Jonny!

- For the February Half Term funday the theme was God's love and we had 28 children and parents/carers attend and they all enjoyed some pancakes and the puppet leading the bible teaching.
- For the Easter funday the theme was the real meaning of Easter, attended by 20 children and parents/carers. They all enjoyed an Easter Egg hunt and the Easter story told by a Palm Tree Puppet.
- For the May Half Term funday the theme was Jesus sleeps through the storm, attended by 16 children and parents/carers, who all enjoyed attending in their pyjamas.
- During the Summer Holidays we had 3 fundays.
 - Schools out party attended by 25 children and parents/carers who all enjoyed celebrating the end of the school year. The theme was the Lost Sheep and the children enjoyed finding the sheep hidden around the PC along with an ice cream station after lunch.
 - Chesham Bois Olympics was attended by 9 children and parents/carers in the PC garden.
 - Messy play was attended by 21 children and parents/carers, who all enjoyed a very messy afternoon including exploring the sensory walk, making their own sandwiches for lunch and even a messy bible teaching involving a cream pie!
- For the October Half Term we held a Light Party, sharing Jesus as the Light of the World. This was attended by 12 children and parents/carers.
- For the Christmas funday we focussed on the real meaning of Christmas, including a pass the parcel with a nativity character under each layer. We had 10 children and parents/carers attend.

2024 was an encouraging year for the youth ministry of St Leonard's. 10 youth attended the Youth Weekend Away in March at The Chellington Centre. It was so encouraging to see our young peoples' faith bearing fruit. 2 of our youth made re-commitments to Jesus and 2 gave their lives to Jesus for the first time - including 1 from outside of our youth!

Another highlight of the year was the Kids and Youth Christmas Service. The youth worked so wonderfully with the kids in preparing for and acting out the sketch, which was rather humorous! 2 of the youth also played in the worship band for the service for the first time. Altogether, it was a very uplifting service!

In January 2024, home groups continued to meet to study the Living in Freedom materials, led by Laurie, Wendy and Ruth and Denise. This was a good opportunity to revisit some teaching for those who have been at St Leonard's for a few years, and to study it for the first time for those who haven't, alongside new material that was introduced in the "plus" course.

Groups had been combined for this series of teaching and in the summer the decision was made to combine the groups permanently going forward, reducing the number of groups to five. This has been hugely beneficial in our group, resulting in a wider leadership team and invigorating discussions each week.



Since September, home groups have been revisiting the teaching from the School of the Prophetic. We have had valuable times of worship, discussion and prayer, framed by short teaching videos from Laurie.

Home groups have also taken on hospitality after the 10:30am Sunday Service, which has been very enjoyable, enabling us to build relationships through team work and to talk to others in our church family that we might not ordinarily spend time with.

We start this report with the vision and values of the school, which have been slightly changed from previous years, because one of the encouraging things we see in the school is the way the school values are so well embodied and lived out by children and adults. It is a delight to see how children thrive at school not only academically but in their uniqueness and in the gifts and talents that they each have.

One of the objectives in the school development plan this year, is to engage further with our ethos and for children to understand what spirituality is. We'll let you know next year how that works out!

An aspect of school life which the church was closely involved with was the Prayer Day, organised to coincide with the World Day of Prayer. Parents, members of St Leonard's and other churches manned six stations. The whole day was welcoming to children of all faiths and none, and children were able to explore different aspects of prayer or simply to reflect on the activities. In 2024, each activity was based on Ecology, stewardship and care of the planet.

Highlights and Lowlights

We heard that the trialling of the Junior Duke of Edinburgh Gold Award was progressing well, including plans to dig over the allotments and grow their own vegetables.

That the Eco-Club had been set up and was working towards achieving the Green Flag award.

The Gardening Club and the woodland area had been revamped and set up, with pupils loving their initial outdoor learning sessions.

The SEND (Children with special learning needs) provision had a boost with the ODBST agreeing to the school to use £62,000 from reserves to allow the SEND Co-ordinator to continue to deliver interventions outside of class. Sadly, funding for this could not continue into 2024/25 and as a result some staff had to be released and remaining staff duties and responsibilities redistributed.

One of the worst things for a school to manage was the tragic death of one of its pupils. This was handled very well by the leadership team with very good support from the ODBST and ODBE. It was pleasing to see the support provided by the community and for the school values to be exhibited amongst all through this difficult period.

In October we celebrated the 130th Birthday of the school being established on this site.

Spiritually, we recognise the great value of "Open the Bible" for the children that St Leonard's organises and also the significance the weekly prayer meeting of parents and governors has on the school each Friday morning. Its been great to see answered prayer and for the way our Lord is blessing so many aspects of this special school.

We also continue to be blessed with staff who care deeply about the children and who provide an inspirational and supportive learning environment. Our children are keen to learn, be kind and generous and our parents support the school in many different ways. Pupil attainment and progress continues to be very good. The school is increasingly popular and continues to be at capacity.

DEANERY SYNOD

Amersham Deanery Synod, a group of representatives from Church of England churches in an area extending beyond Amersham itself which meets four times a year. St Leonard's elected lay members are Peter Flory and Jackie Lambert. The clergy are automatically members.

There are two working sub-committees, the standing committee and the Mission and Pastoral committee which Peter sits on. This gathers and prays for each parish and its current needs and ensures parishes are supported during interregnums. Full details are available on the Amersham Deanery website: amershamdeanery.org.uk.

The March meeting re-elected Mr Lawrence Tebboth as Lay Deanery Lay Chair for the remainder of the 2024 to 2026 triennium and also elected Canon Julie Dziegiel as the Deanery Treasurer and Dorothy Potter as Deanery Secretary. The Deanery Treasurer presented the budget for 2024. It was noted that the rundown of reserves below policy level had continued into 2024. This was a result both of a reduction in rebate from the Diocese following the Deanery not making its full Parish Share, and also the continuing demand to meet some ongoing issues within the Deanery.

We welcomed the Rev'd Asa Humphreys, the Parish Development Advisor (PDA) for the Buckinghamshire Archdeaconry. Asa's role is to work with parishes during their time of vacancies and working with them towards a new appointment. The PDA role has no direct authority, but has links to the many other skills and roles within the Diocesan team. We shared in group discussion where God had been recently present in individual and church lives. The Deanery Synod were asked to consider the new Diocesan Vision of: "Sharing God's love with children and young people: transforming our engagement and recommitting to our Diocesan strategy". The Diocesan Synod resolution that the Deanery would consider at our next meeting was 'That this Synod endorses the need to significantly increase our engagement with children, young people, families and schools building on Disciples Together, and to share the good news of Jesus Christ, and calls on every deanery and benefice in 2024 to develop plans and partnerships for growth'.

Our June meeting was held here in our Parish Centre. The bulk of the meeting was dedicated to a discussion of the Children and young people Diocesan resolution initially considered at the last meeting.

"What issues are stopping our churches flourishing as all age inter-generational communities?" under the headings of: Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities and Threats. Break out groups were provided with flip charts to record views and would be collated and summarised for next synod. Between each breakout sessions there were individual contributions from Rev'd Laurie Clow and Rev'd Victoria Jones on their churches and individual experiences with Children and Young Families experiences. The Rev'd Phil Nightingale had been asked to provide a view of his work with chaplaincy



to the secondary school Chesham Academy. The breakout groups were finally asked to discuss and feedback on; "How can we best support each other across the Deanery? What Diocesan resources would help?

There was no September meeting.

In November, our main focus with lively discussion was on the revised Parish Share for 2024 and 2025. An encouraging presentation of how well the Estates Ministry was going at St George's Little Chalfont by Rev'd David Whale, and the Rev'd Victoria Jones. It was enlightening to see the reality and needs of people that are living on the doorstep of St. Georges. Finally, an update was provided on the work of Deanery Link Mission Partners Steve and Lindsey Poulson.

Needless to say we received our usual regular Area Dean's reports throughout the year along with regular Diocesan and General Synod reports. All papers and minutes can be readily seen on the website amershamdeanery.org.uk

PARISH CENTRE REDEVELOPMENT

Our second application was refused due to concerns about impacts on special areas of conservation. This decision was appealed against in the summer and we are awaiting the planning inspectors visit and decision.
